God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

A Legacy of Generous Love

This September we received what we believe to be the largest lump sum ever left to Redeemer, a gift of \$500,000. This generous legacy gift was left to us by a former Rector the Rev. Ed Whelan and his wife, the Rev. Deacon Jan Whelan. Both of them spent the last years of their lives worshipping at their beloved parish.

The Whelan Trust terms require the Vestry to discern the use of this gift. The first expenditure was our new parking lot, which took nearly a third of the sum at approximately \$170,000. The balance of the remaining amount will be placed in a separate, interest-bearing account until the Vestry has approved a Strategic Plan for the congregation, as well as additional discernment for the best use of the gift.

Evelyn Hanauer, close friend and trustee of the Whelans' estate and longtime Redeemer parishioner shares this about Father Ed and Deacon Jan:

“Fr. Ed and Jan’s hope was that the money they left us would be used in part for a new parking lot and maintenance of that parking lot. We saw that accomplished this Fall. They wanted to make sure we are still standing for the next generation and the generation after that, and for many generations after that. Redeemer held a very special place in their hearts and they wanted to make sure we were able to focus on the day-to-day operation of the church through stewardship from all of us and not have to worry about the major expense of the parking lot. Fr. Ed and Jan were very good stewards of their money or they would not have been able to leave the legacy gift they left us. I am hopeful we will be good stewards of that gift and continue our yearly giving as though we had never received Fr. Ed and Jan’s gift. That gift is not a replacement for our stewardship giving but a nest egg that will continue to grow for years to come and hopefully encourage other legacy gifts.”

On this All Saints’ weekend we give thanks for those who have gone before us and who instilled in us a tradition of giving and generosity. We remember that gifts are not financial only but are reflected in our use of time, talent, and love.
